Description: There are three primary ingredients needed for a market: buyers, sellers, and a price for a good, and sometimes you need a fourth ingredient: namely, a financier. What can we learn from solar? Sellers of solar can rely on a standardized measure of the goods they sell, and, through market dynamics, more easily attract buyers, which in turn attracts financiers. This panel will use the lens of solar to discuss efficiency as a resource in the context of small and medium businesses. It will show that there is indeed the right mix of enabling technologies, standards of measure, willing market participants, and ready financiers to create a scalable and open market. We will discuss the how and why of standards-based approaches to valuing efficiency for both the utility and customer, how and where we can "meter" efficiency reliably, and innovative financing models that can combine to create the confidence a strong market requires.

5C: We Can't Go it Alone: Interagency Partnerships are Critical to Achieving Deeper Energy Improvements in Affordable Multifamily Housing

Description: Multifamily housing is one of the most difficult sectors in which to achieve comprehensive energy improvements, suffering from significant lost opportunity to reduce energy and operating costs. Property owners often have little incentive to fund energy improvements when tenants pay utility bills (the classic split incentive issue). Funders and service providers are not effectively aligned, making the process unattractive for owners, among other challenges. The members of this panel have participated in an interagency collaboration that is successfully tackling these challenges head on. They are doing so through a combination of

Description: After 30-plus years of offering on-bill loans, TVA's local utilities asked for an option for an off-bill solution to help get them out of the banking business. While many power companies highly value financing that supports energy efficiency programs, TVA also had to balance staffing constraints due to tightening budgets. TVA set out to look for an off-bill provider that complemented their new eScore program. This new smart loan complements the streamlined eScore home energy audit. Power companies now have a choice of offering either traditional on-bill or off-bill financing for eScore.
