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
## Better Buildings, Better Plants



- DOE has evolved its industrial partnership program to align it with the Better Buildings Challenge and provide greater integration across the industrial and commercial sectors
- The industrial component of the Better Buildings Challenge provides different opportunities for national recognition based on level of commitment:
  - Better Buildings, Better Plants Challenge Partners agree to transparently pursue innovative approaches to energy efficiency, and make a significant, near-term investment in energy saving projects
  - Better Buildings, Better Plants Program Partners pledge energy savings goals consistent with national targets and agree to report progress annually to DOE

# Better Buildings, Better Plants Program



- Better Buildings, Better Plants Program builds on the success of previous DOE industrial partnership programs. Partners:
  - Set a 10-year, 25% energy intensity improvement target
  - Develop energy management plans
  - Track and report energy data annually to DOE
  - Receive national recognition for their achievements
  - Receive support from technical account managers
- Program currently consists of 110 companies and over 1,400 plants, representing about 5% of total U.S. manufacturing energy footprint
- Most companies are on track to meet the 10-year target

## Better Buildings Challenge



Make commercial and industrial buildings 20% more efficient by 2020; save more than \$40 billion annually for US organizations; create American jobs

- Market leadership; High level partnership with DOE
- Overcome market barriers/persistent obstacles with replicable, marketplace solutions
- Showcasing real solutions; provide models for others to follow
- Recognition from DOE and Administration for success
- Partnering with industry leaders to better understand policy and technical opportunities
- Portfolio wide commitment to continuous improvement
