PRE-FUNDING SEARCH TECHNICAL ASSITANCE RESOURCES

- <u>EPA Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Centers (TICTACs)</u>: EPA and DOE funded technical assistance providers dedicated to removing barriers and providing training to frontline communities in navigating the federal grant application process.
- Local Federal Agency Representatives: Regional representatives from federal agencies tasked with connecting projects to assistance and resources.
 - o <u>Environmental Protection Agency EPA</u>
 - United States Department of Agriculture USDA
 - Department of Energy DOE
- <u>Justice40 Accelerator</u> Cohort driven accelerator program that provides guidance and resources to help grassroots communities secure government funding.
- <u>Local Infrastructure Hub Program</u> Philanthropically funded program equipped to support municipalities and CBOs in pursuing federal funding to enable climate and racial justice work.



FINDING FUNDING

- 1. Check a Wide Array of Resources
 - a. Passive (Newsletters and Email Alerts)
 - 1. EPA Municipal Ombudsman: A bi-weekly newsletter from the EPA listing federal funding opportunities and news from across the federal government. (Subscribe <u>here</u>)
 - 2. DOE Funding Alerts: Alerts from the DOEs various funding programs. Includes press releases and funding announcements the moment they are released. (Subscribe here)
 - 3. Grants.gov Alerts: Customizable, daily alerts from grants.gov. Allows users to specify which types of funding announcements they would likely to receive. (Subscribe here)
 - b. Curated (Pre-established lists of funding opportunities)
 - 1. <u>Justice40 Accelerator Funding List</u>: List of government and philanthropic funding opportunities for climate justice organizations.
 - 2. <u>DOE Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy List</u>: List of DOE grant opportunities for Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Projects.
 - 3. <u>Climate Program Portal List</u>: A regularly updated list of IIJA and IRA funding opportunities and investments (login required but free for 501c3s).
 - c. Research (Combing through opportunities)
 - 1. <u>Grants.gov Grant Search</u>: Federal resource listing all available federal grants
- 2. Identify Key Words and Values
 - a. Ex. resilience, energy-efficiency, community-led, healthy home, retrofit, rehab, electrification, justice 40, disadvantaged, senior, environmental justice, front line community, climate, clean energy, upgrade, buildings, multifamily, decarbonization, net zero, low income,
- 3. Establish Target Grant Parameters
 - a. Consider parameters like grant size (what are the minimum and maximum funding ranges), grant type (is this a discretionary grant, cooperative agreement, or prize program), and grant rules (what requirements does this grant include regarding cost share, subrecipients, etc.)
