

March Update

Friends—

Federal energy efficiency programs remain in chaos—like many federal programs—amid a blizzard of presidential executive orders, White House memos, and agency actions. These disruptions will mean more energy waste.

Some funding for weatherizing low-income homes has been frozen in the middle of winter, some states are halting efficiency rebates because federal funds are cut off, and Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund recipients are laying off staff because President Trump's administration is taking legal action to freeze their funds. Funding for some programs appears to be flowing again.

At the same time, the administration is aggressively shrinking the federal workforce. Even if funding is restored, the agencies may have reduced capacity to manage contracts.

ACEEE continues to work under federal grants when possible (a portion of our funding) and to work with allies to protect critical funding, cut energy waste, and save money.

- The U.S. House of Representatives voted last week to cancel energy efficiency standards for new gas tankless water heaters. The standards, finalized by the Department of Energy (DOE) last year and set to take effect in 2029, will reduce a household's total costs by an average of \$112 over the product's life when compared to purchasing and using lessefficient tankless models, DOE found. More information is available in an ASAP fact sheet.
- Progress continues at the state level:

- The New York State Fire Prevention and Building Code Council <u>voted to move</u> forward with an <u>updated building code</u>, incorporating both the 2024 model codes and the requirements of the All-Electric Buildings Act.
- The Virginia legislature approved a budget <u>restoring funding</u> from the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative for purposes including energy efficiency in affordable housing.
- The Public Utility Commission of Texas <u>launched a review</u> of energy efficiency programs in the state, with initial comments due March 20.




Battery Swapping for Truck Electrification in the United States

- E4TheFuture's <u>Database of Screening Practices</u> has moved to ACEEE's website. The tool

 DC, and Puerto Rico.
- The <u>YBCL Youth Futures Fund</u> provides financial awards to young Black climate leaders who are advocating for and transforming their communities toward racial and climate justice. The application deadline is March 27 for grants of \$2,000–\$10,000.
- The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation invites eligible nonprofits to apply for a grant to collect, analyze, and use data to address inequities in a place's physical, economic, and social conditions. The application deadline is March 18 for grants of \$50,000 each.
